

BRANTWOOD - People can do amazing things when they set their mind to it.

And for 36-year-old Kevin Glenney, it all started when he left Vancouver, Canada.

He's pedaling his way through some Northern Midwestern states to raise money for a cure.



In a little more than a month, this Canadian born cyclist who lives in Minnesota has seen more adventure than some people see in a lifetime.

"I've gone through floods in Alberta and winds across the plains. And I've seen black bears and wolves," Kevin says.

He's putting up with all of it to help find a cure for Huntington's Disease.

It's the illness that affected his grandfather and now ails his aunt and uncle. "Just the fact that my dad was able to come out and start talking about the disease this year has really made a big impact."

And if you don't know by now, this guy's goals are anything short of high.

Kevin says, "So far, I'm at about 58 or 5900 dollars, and I'm aiming at \$30,000 by the time I get to the other side of the continent."

But this is more than just a bike ride. For Kevin, it's a transition from the job he left in Minnesota to the new life he wants to begin.

"I want to do something that makes more of a difference for the world and so this is kind of one way that I can sort of do that."

From Vancouver to Brantwood where we met on Highway 8, Kevin's already pedaled about 2200 miles.

And don't sweat it, because he's only got 3,000 more to go.

Kevin says with Huntington's Disease, the part of the brain that sends signals in and out gets less functional with time.
